

RESOLUTION NO. R-913-15

RESOLUTION URGING THE SOUTH FLORIDA ECOSYSTEM RESTORATION TASK FORCE TO PRIORITIZE BOTH THE COMPLETION OF PHASE 1 AND THE INITIATION OF PLANNING FOR PHASE 2 OF BOTH THE BISCAYNE BAY COASTAL WETLANDS AND C-111 SPREADER CANAL PROJECTS

**WHEREAS**, America's Everglades is a globally unique ecosystem, an International Biosphere Reserve, and a World Heritage Site; and

**WHEREAS**, the health of the Everglades and Biscayne Bay are intrinsically linked to the economic well-being of Miami-Dade County through nature-based tourism and commercial and recreational fishing; and

**WHEREAS**, one-third of all Floridians, nearly seven million people, get their water from sources connected to the Everglades; and

**WHEREAS**, the Everglades and Biscayne Bay are ecological treasures supporting rich biodiversity and an array of critical habitats that provide important front-line defense against the impacts of sea level rise; and

**WHEREAS**, the draining and reengineering of the greater Everglades ecosystem resulted in a precipitous decline in the ecological health of both the Everglades and Biscayne Bay as natural freshwater flows were diverted or discharged in unnatural patterns, causing significant changes to the salinity of Biscayne Bay and Biscayne National Park and degrading marine habitat; and

**WHEREAS**, restoration of the Everglades' ecosystem is critical to ensuring continued clean water supply, environmental and public health, and the economic viability of Miami-Dade County; and

**WHEREAS**, the Biscayne Bay Coastal Wetlands (BBCW) project, a critical component of the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan (CERP), as authorized by Congress in 2000, is intended to restore natural coastal wetlands habitat by redistributing freshwater flow through more natural "sheet flows," and reconnecting coastal and marine habitat in Biscayne Bay and Biscayne National Park; and

**WHEREAS**, the BBCW project will provide increased water storage and stage in wetlands to protect against saltwater intrusion, and thereby increase resiliency against sea level rise, particularly in southern Miami-Dade County; and

**WHEREAS**, phase 1 of the BBCW project is intended to divert available flows from the regional canal system to adjacent wetland areas via spreader canals to improve salinity in portions of Biscayne Bay; and

**WHEREAS**, phase 2 of the BBCW project is intended to divert the remaining flows from the C-103 Canal for additional improvements to salinity in Biscayne Bay and to rehydrate wetlands in the Model Lands using available flows from the Florida City Canal; and

**WHEREAS**, the Model Lands wetland area contains more than 20,000 acres of important wetlands that connect the Everglades to Biscayne Bay and Card Sound; and

**WHEREAS**, the Model Lands wetlands must be restored not only to save the greater Everglades ecosystem but to also protect the potable water resources of the Biscayne Aquifer in south Miami-Dade County; and

**WHEREAS**, completion of BBCW phase 1 and initiating planning for BBCW phase 2 are both critical for Biscayne Bay and Biscayne National Park; and

**WHEREAS**, the C-111 Spreader Canal (C-111) project is designed to improve the quality, timing, and distribution of fresh water to Florida Bay through Taylor Slough in Everglades National Park and to bring more fresh water to the wetlands feeding into Biscayne Bay and Biscayne National Park; and

**WHEREAS**, phase 1 of the C-111 project is intended to reduce seepage from Everglades National Park to the C-111 basin in order to improve conditions in Taylor Slough; and

**WHEREAS**, phase 2 is intended to rehydrate the Model Lands; and

**WHEREAS**, completion of phase 1 of the C-111 project and initiating planning for phase 2 are necessary to achieve the significant ecological benefits of the project; and

**WHEREAS**, salt water intrusion of the Biscayne Aquifer is rapidly advancing landward in portions of south Miami-Dade County that would be restored under the second phases of BBCW and C-111 projects; and

**WHEREAS**, these projects have the potential to retard the advancement of the salt front in Miami-Dade County; and

**WHEREAS**, the South Florida Ecosystem Restoration Task Force, consisting of federal, tribal, and state and local government representatives, was established in 1996 to coordinate policies, strategies, plans, programs, projects, activities, priorities, and scientific research addressing the restoration, preservation, and protection of the South Florida ecosystem; and

**WHEREAS**, the South Florida Ecosystem Restoration Task Force coordinates and prioritizes Everglades restoration projects; and

WHEREAS, this Board would like to strongly urge the South Florida Ecosystem Restoration Task Force to prioritize both the completion of phase 1 and the initiation of planning for phase 2 of both the Biscayne Bay Coastal Wetlands and C-111 Spreader Canal projects,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that this Board:

Section 1. Urges the South Florida Ecosystem Restoration Task Force to prioritize both the completion of phase 1 and the initiation of planning for phase 2 of both the Biscayne Bay Coastal Wetlands and C-111 Spreader Canal projects.

Section 2. Directs the Clerk of the Board to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to the Chair of the South Florida Ecosystem Restoration Task Force.

The Prime Sponsor of the foregoing resolution is Commissioner Daniella Levine Cava. It was offered by Commissioner Dennis C. Moss, who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Rebeca Sosa and upon being put to a vote, the vote was as follows:
